UAH Announce Shortlist & Public Vote for the Heritage Angel Awards Northern Ireland 2021

Ulster Architectural Heritage is delighted to announce that voting is now open for this year's Heritage Angel Awards Public Vote, in association with the Irish News! Following a one year break, the Heritage Angel Awards are back to celebrate important and inspiring heritage projects across Northern Ireland. The annual awards aim to celebrate unsung angels of local heritage- individuals or groups, who have rescued an historic building or site, worked as craftspeople or apprentices, or recorded and interpreted a historic place. Now it's the public's opportunity to have their say and vote for their favourite heritage project!

UAH is now calling for members of the public to cast their vote for their choice from the shortlist online. Full details and films on each of the shortlisted nominees can be viewed at www.heritageangelawards-ni.org.uk. This is open until midnight on Sunday 14th November.

This year we have 18 projects across six categories which showcase a hugely diverse range of heritage initiatives across Northern Ireland. The 2021 shortlist includes entries from the Grand Opera House and the auditorium restoration project, the Railway Preservation Society of Ireland as well as community group Friends of Shankill Graveyard and St Macartan's Church, Augher. The diverse nature of the entries demonstrates the importance placed upon the preservation of built heritage within our society, and the focus on restoring buildings going into the future. The awards showcase what is possible when passionate people take action for the care and consideration of our heritage.

The outcome of each category and the public vote will be announced at the Heritage Angel Awards Northern Ireland ceremony on Tuesday 23rd November at Belfast City Hall. This special event will be hosted by Wendy Austin, with a number of special guests, including Joe Mahon, Anne Marie McAleese and Tim McGarry.

This year, UAH has expanded the Heritage Angel Awards Northern Ireland to include the Heritage Arts Challenge, supported by the National Lottery Heritage Fund. Over the past few months, workshops have been held to develop the talents of both amateur and professional artists across the province and beyond in five fields: poetry, prose, song-writing, drawing and photography. The winning entries will be showcased on the night, and the awards will also feature performances by project mentor Brigid O'Neill and by Anthony Toner.

Due to Covid-19, the in-person event will this year be limited to invited guests only; however it will also be livestreamed online to allow the public voters to cheer on their entry from home! For further information visit https://heritageangelawards-ni.org.uk/
